# History of the Month

## WHERE TO PAN FOR GOLD IN OREGON

To find gold, you should go where gold has been found before in northeast Oregon, southwest Oregon, and the Western Cascades. These areas have many streams and rivers that can be successfully panned for gold.

## FEDERAL LANDS

Mining claims on Federal land are not open for gold panning unless permission has been granted by the owner. However, four areas have been set aside on Federal land in Oregon for recreational gold panning:

## Area 1. Quartzville Recreational Corridor:

Located in the Western Cascades, Salem District, Bureau of Land Management (free site). The Salem District Office address is 1717 Fabry Road SE, Salem, OR 97306, phone (503) 375-5646.

### Area 2. Butte Falls Recreational Area:

Located in southwestern Oregon, Medford District, Bureau of Land Management (free site). The Medford address is 3040 Biddle Road, Medford, OR 97504, phone (541) 770-2200.

## Area 3. Applegate Ranger District:

Located in southwestern Oregon, Rogue River National Forest (four fee sites where there is a charge of a dollar a day for panning in areas adjacent to campgrounds). The Applegate Ranger District address is 6941 Upper Applegate Road, Jacksonville, OR 97530, phone (541) 899-1812.

## Area 4. Wallowa-Whitman National Forest:

Located in northeastern Oregon (free sites). Forest Supervisor is located at PO Box 907, Baker City, OR 97814, phone (541) 523-6391. Recreational gold

mining in the Wallowa-Whitman National Forest are listed below:

Most campgrounds and major roads are withdrawn from mineral entry in order to keep people from tearing them up or destroying them. Currently they do not have an area specifically set aside for mining but there are lots of places on the forest service lands that are open and checking with your local Forest Service office would be a great place to start.

Camping, but "no mining" within the camp sites themselves:

a. Eagle Forks Campground, 9 mi northwest of Richland, T. 8 S., R. 44 E., Pine Ranger District, Halfway, OR 97834, phone (541) 742-7511.

b. McCully Forks Campground, on McCully Forks Creek just west of Sumpter, T. 9 S.,

R. 36 E.; Deer Creek Campground, on Deer Creek north of Phillips Lake, T. 9 S., R. 38 E.

b.1. Powder River Recreational Area, on the Powder River just below Mason Dam, T. 10 S., R. 39 E.; all located in the Baker Ranger District, Baker City, OR 97814, phone (541) 523-4476.

c. Antlers Guard Station, on the Burnt River, T. 11 S., R. 36 E., Unity Ranger District, Unity, OR 97884, phone (541) 446-3351.

In addition, gold panning is permitted on nearly all streams and rivers running through campgrounds on Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and USDA Forest Service (USFS) land in Oregon.

Maps showing locations of campgrounds may be obtained from local BLM and USFS offices; from the Nature of the Northwest Information Center, 800 NE Oregon St. #5, Suite 177, Portland, OR 97232, phone (503) 872-2750; or from the BLM Oregon State Office, PO Box 2965, 1515 SW First, Portland, OR 97208, phone (503) 952-6002.

# Entries for the 'Baker County Gold' Category Cornucopia

Not far from the Idaho border, and 15 miles north of Halfway, Oregon is the old ghost/mining town of **Cornucopia**. To reach Cornucopia, just travel on the Cornucopia Highway from Halfway, located in Baker County. Cornucopia is located at an elevation of 4700 feet in the Wallowa-Whitman National Forest. Cornucopia is actually two towns created by two different mining operations.



Gold was first discovered in Cornucopia in 1884 by a man by the name of Lon Simmons. Old timers would say that some of the ore was so rich that large nuggets would fall right out of the rocks. There were plenty of High-graders. High-graders were men who worked for the mining companies, who just so happened to have gold fall into their shirts or boots. High-grading was common. More than sixteen mines riddle the area and produced 300,000 ounces of gold. Like many mines during world war II, Cornucopia was closed down because it was deemed non-essential mining in the fight against Japan and Germany. Cornucopia in Latin means "Horn of Plenty," but miners named the town after Cornucopia, Nevada.



Today, there is some newer dwellings among the ghost town, but it has plenty of older buildings that still remain from a time not so long ago. Old tailing piles from placer operations are piled along the creek banks. There is old rusting machinery and plenty of still-standing buildings. The buildings take a toll each winter. Here snow has been known to get up to 15 feet deep. Several big gold booms happened between 1884-1886. Cornucopia had several amenities including a store, two saloons and two restaurants. As far as mining towns go, Cornucopia was rather orderly. There were only a few killings over the years.

Over 30 miles of tunnels are scattered over the adjoining mountains in the Cornucopia area and over 6,000 feet of shafts (some of the longest shafts in the United States). The larger mines are known as the Union-Companion Mine, the Last Chance Mine, Queen of the West Mine, and the Red Jacket Mine.



The Last Chance mine was a pocket gold mine. The Union-Companion was a very good producer and was said to have been on the vein itself. In the old days, horses were used to move the ore, but then the railroad was laid and the invention of the pneumatic drill helped the miners to do much better than they did previously. In 1922, the Cornucopia mines received electricity and a twenty-stamp mill was put into operation. It is said that the 20 stamp mill could crush 60 tons of ore per day.

One of the most important things to note was that the Cornucopia Mining Companies employed over 700 men in the early 1900's. At its peak, the Cornucopia Mine was the 6th largest mining operation in the United States. In all, it is estimated that over \$20,000,000 in gold was taken at gold prices at a mere \$20 an ounce. It is estimated that 80% of the gold ore body still remains.


